

THE PROFESSIONAL ACTOR TRAINING PROGRAM (PATP)

The PATP is a three-year conservatory program leading to a Master of Fine Arts degree, designed to prepare students for careers in the professional theatre. Ten actors are chosen every year from national auditions of approximately one thousand candidates.

The rigorous training includes work in a range of types and styles of performance, including non-realistic, realistic, classical and contemporary plays. The program is intense and demanding, with actors working from 9-5, Monday-Friday, with an additional 25 hours per week spent in rehearsals. The overall aim of the program is to provide students with the practical skills necessary to fully reveal their artistic ideas. The PATP is consistently ranked among the very best graduate training programs in the nation.

The financial commitment our students undertake to complete their training is considerable. The School of

Ms. Corthron's plays have been developed or produced at the Ensemble Studio Theatre, Center Stage (Baltimore), African Continuum Theatre, De Theatre School, Julliard School, and the University of Maryland (Baltimore).
